National Airmail Week 1938 May 15th to 21st



We take for granted the stunning scientific achievements of the last century --- like our mastery of the air. With walks on the moon a distant memory and a new space station a building, the only time air travel is mentioned is when we complain about how late our flight was. Today, we even take for granted that most of our ordinary first class mail w i I I travel by a ir!

But in 1938, the story was much different. With the world mired in the Great Depression, air transport companies were struggling, but developing. Air travel was still a novelty to many; after all, the Wright Brothers had taken their first flight at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina just 35 years before.

In an effort to help the airline companies and at the same time promote air mail service, a nation-wide public relations campaign was launched. Dubbed the National Air Mail Week (NAMW), activities were planned to honour twenty years of air mail service in the United States. Held May 15 thru 21, 1938, the goal of the organizers was to get each citizen to mail and/or receive an air mail letter during the week-long celebration.

Festivities were kicked off with the issuance of a new 6 cent Eagle multi-colour air mail stamp (Scott #C23, shown above) on Saturday, May 14th. For the next seven days, thousands of communities across the 48 States and most U.S. Territories became involved with their own local activities.

Along with all the varied local events, from the largest cities to the smallest crossroads, an estimated 10,000 individual cachets were prepared, giving each of the localities a chance to brag about the beauty, history and/or progressivism of their home towns.

While these cachets were available for use the entire week, most of these covers were mailed on Thursday, May 19th to be carried on special one-day-only NAMW

flights, linking all the thousands of participating sites.

Many local airports were dedicated during National Air Mail Week, but if the sites had no air facilities, organizers were very creative in accommodating these special flights. Fields were cleared and back roads were closed, creating temporary runways to allow these planes to land and take-off, carrying their precious NAMW cargoes.

Miraculously, weather delayed only a few flights, and only one of the special flights crashed. No one was hurt, and the covers were safely delivered by motor car!!

A few years ago, NAMW covers could easily be found in dealers' "junque" boxes. As more and more collectors discovered these little examples of local pride, these covers became harder to find, but with new varieties discovered regularly, the hunt for these covers can be fun and rewarding!

On Thursday, May 19th over 1,700 special one-day-only flights occurred carrying these specially prepared air mail covers linking location to location. Forty-three special flights were made by women pilots. One special flight was made by the first black pilot to carry airmail. Grover C Nash flew a special one-day flight from Chicago via Mattoon IL to Charleston IL. Many local airports were dedicated during the week. Some special flights were delayed due to weather and only one of the special flights crashed.


Over 16.2 million letters/covers and 9 thousand parcels were transported by air that week.

Australian Stamp Reprints

Hi, I love collecting Australian stamps. They are both beautiful to look at, and very informative. Sometimes I come across a variation of my usual stamps, and I'd like to share with you information about reprint selvedge stamps.

From 1989, Australia Post began identifying reprints with symbols in both side selvedges adjacent to alternate rows of stamps. The symbols were: bone koala for the first reprint up to four koalas for the forth reprint. The fifth reprint was marked by a kangaroo and the sixth by one kangaroo and one koala etc. From 1993, the symbols appeared against all rows in both selvedges. Self-adhesive rolls of stamps had the symbols applied on the back of the backing paper, and booklets were marked in various places.





The highest reprint I have is 2 kangaroos and one koala, indicating the stamp is in it's 11th reprint. I wonder if you have reprints in your collections?

I'd love to hear from you and share this interesting side collection of Australian stamps. I also enjoy visiting different Post Offices in search of a reprint stamp to my collection

From the Archives

During the 1930's two prominent Ballarat citizens, Mr. A. A. Bromley and Mr. James F Kittson were noted as keen philatelists. Mr. Bromley is recorded as entering in the 1932 Australian Philatelic Exhibition in Sydney a winning exhibit of Australian Commonwealth in blocks of four, 1st and 2nd watermarks up to 1/- value; 3rd watermark up to 5/- value and also a complete issue of all watermarks in singles. Mr. Kittson entered the 1934 Victorian Centenary Exhibition with an entry described "as highly specialized, housed in 11 "Crown" and "Acme" albums. Very strong in all items of technical importance, such as controls and imprints....., retouches, re-entries, substituted clichés, flaws, plate numbers etc. Great attention has been paid to the arrangement and the condition of the collection." Mr. Kittson's interest in philately continued into the 1960's when he revisited the Ballarat Philatelic Society to show members some of the "rare items" he had entered in exhibitions.


