Member Profile - Dianne Whitford



Dianne has been collecting stamps since 1997, a relatively short time compared to some who have been collecting since childhood. She is a long standing member of the Ballarat Philatelic Society having served eight years as secretary and a number of years as the Society's Librarian.

Dianne's collection consists of Pre & Decimal Australian stamps and Covers – she is aiming to have a complete mint collection of Decimal Stamps 1966 to 2006, 40 Years and Covers to 2016, 50 Years of Decimal Postage.

When she first joined the club not so many years ago, everyone would ask, "What is your theme?" and she would say "Australian Stamps" which apparently was boring and common. She thought it must be important to have a theme so her search for an inspiring theme began with

butterflies, coins, maps, and on it went. One night at a club auction a member suggested that she bid for a small album of stamps with a theme that she may find interesting and not wanting to be boring and common, she successfully bid for the little album and her thematic collection of "STAMPS ON STAMPS" began.

"STAMPS ON STAMPS" feature stamps that depict previous stamp issues reproduced on a stamp usually to celebrating an anniversary of the initial stamp, a Birthday, the Death of Royalty or the anniversary major events.

Dianne now collects these stamps world wide and has eleven albums. In the course of collecting these stamps she has learnt so much about other countries. Even just finding out where they are she has found interesting – Forayer for instance is one place she knew nothing about. Forayer is a small island which is located between Iceland and Norway.

Dianne has given herself a challenge to find the stamp with the most stamps on the stamp. So far a Colombian stamp has 22 to celebrate Philatelica Expo 1970.







Dianne also collect Birds of Prey, Australian Defence Force on Stamps and anything Ausipex 84, Australia's 1st International Expo.

Philatelic collecting can be very Diverse, Interesting and Challenging.

Questions are often asked about how do we remove self adhesive stamps from backing paper. Neil found this product on the internet and has successfully trialled it. The directions for use are "Stamp lift remover is applied to the stamp to remove it from the letter / cover. Stamp lift safely removes the whilst stamp also preserving the aum. Apply a few drops to the reverse, allow a moment for the Stamplift to penetrate then lift the stamp from the envelop "

Useful Web Pages

Removing self adhesive stamps is always a pricly question so having just completed the "On the Grapevine" piece for this newsletter I thought that I would check out what the "experts" have to say about removing



stamps from paper. I decided to search "how to remove postage stamps from paper" and come up with a plethora of suggestions and videos. Suggestions included putting a few drops of water on the stamp and "nuking" it in the microwave for 20 seconds.

Tangier, British Offices (1924-1956) King George V1 Issue - Overprinted.



The International Zone of Tangier, located on northwest coast of Morocco, the administered by a committee of foreign powers from 1924 - 1956. When Spain and France divided Morocco for colonization in 1912, Tangier remained a disputed area, primarily because of its strategic location at the mouth of the Mediterranean Sea. As a result, it was decided that Tangier would become International Zone. The agreement was put on hold because World War I and wasn't finalized until Dec 18, 1923 in the Tangier Protocol. With the exception of Spanish Occupation during World War II, Tangier remained an international zone until it became part of the newly created Kingdom of Morocco in 1956. Great Britain, like France and maintained a post office in Tangier throughout its existence.

In the Scramble for Africa, European powers carved up the continent of Africa for colonization. While the French laid claim to most of North and Western Africa, Spain received a few territories along the Atlantic coast. Even after the 1884 Berlin Conference, Morocco remained a disputed area, especially in the north, as the British didn't want any other European powers to control the land across from Gibraltar.

A side agreement was finally reached in 1904, where Spain and France could carve up Morocco with

However, the Germans were furious that they weren't involved in the negotiation. This situation prompted Kaiser Wilhelm II to visit Tangier on March 31, 1905, where he gave a speech calling for Moroccan independence. This was a direct challenge to French influence in the region, setting up the first Moroccan Crisis.

Over the next few years the Great Powers postured, and Germany and France became bitter rivals. Eventually most nations sided with France (except Austria-Hungry) and in 1912. The Sultan Morocco was forced to divide the country between France and Spain, becoming their protectorates. Thus, Morocco became the last territory in Africa to be colonized. Tangier, however, would be designated as а joint protectorate administered by France, Spain and Great Britain.

The outbreak of WWI complicated the agreement, and the final implementation of the international status wasn't officially ratified until 1923. Over time, additional countries were added to the agreement as administering powers, including the Netherlands, Belgium, Sweden, Portugal, and Italy.

During WW2, Spanish troops occupied Tangier on Jun 14, 1940, the day that Paris fell to the Germans. Italy, being an Axis country, was dropped as an administrator. After the war, Spanish troops withdrew from Tangier on Oct 11, 1945 and the United States and the USSR were added as administrators while Italy was re-instated.

During much of its existence, the International Zone of Tangier was a haven for

spies, smugglers, free thinkers, artists and those seeking a hedonistic lifestyle. Also, during the time, Great Britain, Spain and France had active post offices in the city.
